Last February over 100 CPC'ers volunteered for a Kingdom Assignment. The Assignment came with a \$100 bill and a few simple instructions:

1. Remember, this money is not yours, it's God's!
2. Ask God to put a person, a cause or a ministry on your heart and multiply the money in order to be a blessing in the name of Christ.
3. Tell us what happens.

What has happened since that time is a miraculous outpouring of God's Spirit, through God's people! Kingdom Assignments have changed lives locally and around the world. Individuals have been blessed. Ministries have been empowered. Needs have been met.

In many ways, God is using Kingdom Assignments as a catalyst to change the heart and the culture of CPC. We are becoming a church whose first instinct is to reach out to others with the love and compassion of Christ.

This booklet contains a handful of Kingdom Assignment stories. They are powerful testimonies of God at work through the people of CPC. More than anything, it's our prayer that they will stir in you, a desire to accept and fulfill whatever assignment God puts on *your* heart, for the sake of His Kingdom!

VALLEY PREGNANCY CENTER—DUBLIN, CA

When I accepted \$100 for the Kingdom Assignment, I felt excited, and thought it was an awesome thing to wonder what God would do with this money! I knew He was up to something big because before we even left the church another member of my small group, Laurel Moehrl, was given \$100 by a member to use for the cause and Nella Powell volunteered to help us as well. Our entire small group jumped on board and shared in the excitement. Pat Serpan and Peg Alman said they would like to be involved and became part of our effort.

PRAYERS FOR GUIDANCE

We decided to spend the first week praying for guidance since we had no preconceived ideas about what to do. At our second meeting we just talked about what we were hearing back. You know it is a “God thing” when 8 women agree in 30 minutes what to do and how to do it! We decided to have a **BABY SHOWER** for the Valley Pregnancy Center (VPC). We learned that VPC provides a layette for each expectant mother who chooses to keep her baby. Our hearts were touched to know there are as many as 1500 hundred women in our area struggling with the question of unplanned pregnancy each year who receive counseling at the VPC.



ONE BIG BABY SHOWER

We decided to spend our money on invitations (designed by Laurel Moehrl) and invite 110 women to a baby shower for an “unknown Mom and unknown Baby.” We included neighbors, friends and family; Christians and non-Christians; we included people from other churches. We also received donations from a baby shop in Danville. Once the invitations went out the fun really began...our baby shower took on a life of its' own. People we invited got their small groups to get involved, and friends told other friends. The event just took off and we just watched in wonder as people called to say they had something for the shower.

ABUNDANT RESULTS

Praise God! We estimate that 75 people outside our small group of 11 contributed to the assignment. We conservatively estimate that our \$100 brought back \$6,500.00 in cash, gift cards and baby items. We collected 888 diapers, 235 outfits, 52 blankets, 47 baby caps, a new crib, a car seat, and a port-a-crib. The list goes on and on. We were totally overwhelmed at how big God made this baby shower. At the end of the event, there were three large round tables heaping with baby goods, as well as items on the floor around them. The generosity of all the people was inspiring. All we did was provide an opportunity to participate! I will never forget the exclamations of sheer joy coming from these women as we fawned over each item.

I speak for my entire small group of Francis Davis, Ingrid Barnes, Gayle Whittaker, Patti Callahan, Carol Jagoe, Patricia Wade, Laurel Moehrl, Juanita Harding, Pat Serpan, Nella Powell and Peg Allman, when I say, **God sure surprised us!** He showed up in a bigger way than we ever imagined! The greatest impact is yet to be, as expectant moms are given a lovely layette for their babies. Our prayer is that each mother and her child will know how much they are loved.

SHALOM OF OAKLAND – EAST OAKLAND, CA

After much prayer, we decided to use our Kingdom Assignment money to support Shalom of Oakland (www.shalomofOakland.com). Shalom of Oakland, founded by Nate and Andrea Millheim, has a mission to come alongside children and families in East Oakland, growing together towards a way of life that is rooted in Jesus and brings wholeness to our neighborhoods. We (our family) already support this ministry on a monthly basis, but wanted to make others aware of what the Millheims are doing in East Oakland and the positive impact it is having on the youth in that area. Shalom of Oakland has an after-school community center for students in 1st – 8th grade. They are trying to raise more so they can hire local high school students as summer interns. They would like to be able to pay them a small stipend.

INFORMATIONAL DINNER YIELDS 40 FOLD RETURN!

We held an informational dinner at our house and invited our friends to come. Our \$100 grew to **\$4,374**. Three families donated healthy snacks for the kids who come to the community center and 2 families donated books as well.



AWARENESS

I believe our assignment impacted our friends and family, by making them aware of Shalom of Oakland and the amazing work God is doing there through the Millheims, as well as benefiting the children in East Oakland.

GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS!

Doing this Kingdom Assignment reminded us that our money isn't ours – it's God's. And when we use it the way God wants us to – he will do amazing things with it. I was really afraid the money wouldn't grow above the original \$100 and that no one would be interested in our Kingdom Assignment. But God definitely answered prayers and grew the money and involved many people to do it.

BAY AREA ST. VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

We were excited to accept the challenge. I've been researching volunteering opportunities to do as a family so this came at the perfect time. Teaching our children the importance of giving vs. receiving is a priority for us and something we focus on all the time.

Our hearts are concerned for families and individuals in our community who need assistance during these tough economic times so we decided to raise money for The Bay Area St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVDP). SVDP is a non-profit organization that provides direct assistance to anyone suffering or in need. They offer a lifeline to those in want of food and clothing, rent assistance, medical aid, help with addiction or incarceration, employment and shelter. The motto of the St. Vincent de Paul Society is "no act of charity is foreign to the Society". We especially like that SVDP is opening a Free Dining Room and Community Center at their Pittsburg District Council Offices. "Our Free Dining Room will provide a stable place where those most affected by the uncertainty of our economy, those who have lost their jobs, will find a hot meal, resources and a spirit of hope from our Vincentian Community Volunteers."



EASTER TREAT TOWERS

We sold Easter Treat Towers to our friends and family and raised \$1,130. We received 20 orders at \$50 each and \$130 in donations.

We created a total of 30 treat towers: We received 20 orders, plus we created an additional 10 treat towers for our children's teachers and caregivers. Every tower was created with so much love...we baked each order of cookies, assembled each box with colorful tissue and decorated the towers with beautiful ribbon, a silk gerbera daisy and sparkly Easter egg. We mailed 4 towers out of state and delivered 26 around the Bay Area. We delivered to 4 convalescent homes and lots of grandparents. The day before Easter, our family circled the Bay Area delivering towers. It was a joy to see the look on peoples faces when they realized that the present was for them. The kids were very proud of their work and we talked all week about the spirit of giving and how we can demonstrate it on a daily basis.

MAKE SERVICE A PRIORITY

We found that it's not hard to find ways to give and serve others; you just have to make it a priority and do it. My family loved doing this project together and it created wonderful conversations about who we were helping and why. We feel like we're the ones who received the biggest blessing from this assignment. It was a great experience and we're going to make this a yearly tradition.

RUN FOR PETE’S SAKE – DANVILLE, CA

My reaction to receiving the \$100 for the Kingdom Assignment was very emotional. I just knew I wanted to do something for my friend's Dad who has liver cancer, and that I was supposed to raise my hand. I felt God telling me to stand up. Since my friend and I are both on the track team at Monte Vista High School, I thought maybe a “fun run” to raise money for Mr. Mehiel’s (Pete) cancer treatment would be a good idea.

HOW IT ALL CAME TOGETHER

My mom helped me decide on a theme for the run and her friend helped me with the t-shirt design. We were able to buy 160 shirts at a cost of \$3.50 each, and asked for donations of \$25 per shirt. My mom was available after school, and I took some to school, and to ROCK (CPC’s senior high youth group). I put up a group on Facebook, “Run for Pete’s Sake”, with the following description:

One day in church our Pastor was talking about this thing called a kingdom assignment and the first thing that came to mind was my friend’s dad who has liver cancer. So this Run on Sunday April 25th is set up to help that friend! It costs 25 dollars and you get a t-shirt!!! All the money goes straight to Evan’s Dad (NAMED PETE) even the checks are going to be made out in his name(Pete Mehiel)!!



The Run is going to be around 3 miles starting at Monte Vista and going through downtown Danville, and if you don't wanna run that's fine just help out or just buy the t-shirt the more money we make the better! please help out and let me know if you have any questions! Date: Sunday April 25! at 9am starting at Oak Hill Park in Danville:)

THE CHECKS ARE STILL COMING IN

The race was held April 25 starting at Oak Hill Park in Danville. The total amount collected so far is about \$13,000. Mr. Mehiel was blown away! And, the checks are still coming in. My friends helped advertise, my mom and other friend's mom purchased the shirts, and another really cool part was that The Yogurt Shack donated "Make your own frozen yogurt" to all who participated. We actually ran out of shirts, so I brought a stamp that said my name on it, and a pink stamp pad. During the beginning of the race my Mom was given lots of donations and I got to go around and stamp my name on the donor's hands.

I'd say this race has impacted hundreds of people, in addition to benefiting Mr. Mehiel. It was cool to get ROCK students involved and even better that it wasn't just a Monte Vista High School event. We had kids and parents from San Ramon High and from De La Salle participate as well. Personally, I feel so much closer to God and know that he will be there for whatever help I need. I also think this has helped some of my friends know more of who God is.

BAY AREA RESCUE MISSION – RICHMOND, CA

My wife and I took the assignment on impulse without a clear vision for how we would be moved to complete it. We placed the envelope on our fridge and prayed and eventually decided to collect food for the Bay Area Rescue Mission in Richmond.

WE ATTACKED THE PROBLEM ON TWO FRONTS

We have worked with the Mission previously and they had put a request out for specific food items. We attacked the problem on two fronts. First, we purchased two large plastic bins and placed them at Margaret's place of employment with a note informing her co-workers that we were collecting food stuffs for the Mission. We provided a list of specific food items needed and invited contributions. Both bins were overflowing within a week!

Concurrently we prepared paper shopping bags with a note introducing ourselves and explaining this opportunity for our neighbors to fill the bag with food stuffs for the Mission. We distributed these bags to each neighbor on our street by leaving them on their door steps (about 28 houses). Over a dozen bags were returned to our front porch during the next week. Some financial donations were also received and we used these to purchase food at Costco.



FOOD AND DIAPERS FOR THE MISSION

We delivered 600 pounds of dried foods to the Mission and also 564 paper diapers. Estimated value of food stuffs and diapers collected and donated was \$1000.00. We involved over 100 individuals including people in our immediate neighborhood. It impacted all of the employees at Margaret's place of work and all of our neighbors (even those who got our note but were unable to contribute), not to mention the staff and members at the Mission. We received numerous comments from participants saying they were thrilled to be able to contribute and thought it was a great idea.

EXCITED ABOUT AN OPPORTUNITY TO GIVE

We found that people are excited about being provided with an opportunity to give and we are planning to do this in our neighborhood on a routine basis. Also, it is a great way to engage with our neighbors.

MEALS FOR THE HOMELESS IN BERKELEY, CA

When I first accepted the \$100 bill, I was excited for the opportunity to do a Kingdom Assignment, but did not know exactly what God had in mind for me to do. I eventually decided to use the money to prepare and distribute meals for the homeless in Berkeley.

My Kingdom Assignment funds were multiplied by getting other high school students involved in the project, and benefiting a least one dozen homeless persons. Fellow ROCK students Robbie Thomas, Ryan Fette, Pauline Van Backle, Sarah Athern, and Sunee Washom helped me prepare and distribute some high quality lunches of roast beef or turkey sandwiches, fruit, Peet's coffee, and cookies. We felt led to make a nice quality meal to show the great love of Jesus Christ. The thought was that if Jesus were physically here, we would definitely give Him the best food we have, and if we're called to show the love of Jesus to all and to see him in everyone, then it's only natural to give the homeless the best we've got!

A dozen homeless men and women in People's Park and Telegraph Avenue were impacted by this assignment, as they received the lunches we made. All of them were incredibly grateful for the blessing of a wholesome meal. The experience was an eye-opener for me, and a few of the interactions really stood out. The first is one with Michael, a disabled Vietnam veteran. When he received his lunch, he began to share with us how great God is and how incredibly blessed he was. I was simply stunned to hear a *homeless* man talk about how *blessed* he is! We also had another special interaction with Methias who we also met on Telegraph when he asked for some coffee for some of his friends in People's Park.

After some conversation, he essentially started preaching the gospel to us in an incredible way. He proclaimed continually that “Jesus is Lord!” and talked about faith and Jesus and his journey and it was simply amazing! Throughout the trip, we did not try and force conversation about faith, spirituality, and Jesus on people, but rather preached the Gospel through our actions.

All of us who were a part of the Assignment were blessed by it as much as we blessed others. It was amazing to have meaningful conversations with homeless men and women and to learn more about their lives and perspectives on life. Where I used to feel nothing but sympathy towards the homeless, I now am actually jealous of many aspects of their lives. The homeless community in Berkeley is very loving and almost all are extremely generous with what little they do have, love one another in incredible ways, and understand what life without so much “stuff” looks like. It’s truly incredible to see.

One of the things that Methias talked about that really hit home for me was that we as a whole have really lost sight of what it looks like to take only as much as we *need*, and that God desires for us to only take what we *need* and nothing more (Exodus 16:16). This trip helped me to realize that fact more fully and respond to it by donating/ giving away/ selling much of my “excess” stuff.

There were a number of parallels between my experience on this Berkeley trip and the Mexico Missions Trip. On both I trips I saw what life without excessive material wealth and possessions looks like. I am incredibly grateful for the ways that God worked through the trip and am excited to continue making similar trips to Berkeley to continue ministering to and developing relationships with the homeless there!

BAY AREA CRISIS NURSERY (BACN) – CONCORD, CA

I knew the moment I raised my hand to accept the \$100.00 bill that it would be used for abused children or children in need. The money doubled before I left the sanctuary February 14th thanks to some wonderful friends! I sent an email to friends and family sharing what I was doing. The money grew to \$865.00. I shopped sales, used coupons and Kohl's cash to purchase baby/children's apparel. I spoke to store managers and asked for deeper discounts. The total retail value of the items procured was \$2,311.48.

FEELING BLESSED

I had many conversations regarding my Kingdom Assignment (friends, family, customers in line with me, store cashiers). One cashier shared that she and her children were just recently able to move out of a shelter that they had been in for 5 months. We both cried together right there at the register! I left feeling very blessed and grateful to have had this opportunity. There were other similar stories. I was blessed by each conversation that I had in line with other customers and with the cashiers. I have had several friends ask for more information on the BACN, including where to donate and how to volunteer.

MARCH DELIVERY

On March 19, 2010 my son, Matthew and his friend Louis and I delivered 127 sets of new summer pajamas, 95 toothbrushes and toothpaste to the Bay Area Crisis Nursery in Concord. My son and his friend were very touched when we delivered the pajamas, had a tour and met some young children.

**GREENHOUSE KIDS—
SACRAMENTO, CALIFORNIA**

When our church reintroduced the Kingdom Assignment program, my husband and I raised our hands for \$100. We prayed the Lord would show us how He wanted us to multiply the money. We then contacted our daughter, Kacie Stratton. Kacie is founder and director of a Christian non-profit community center in Sacramento called the GreenHouse. The GreenHouse offers after school tutoring and mentoring programs for at risk students.

PERLA’S HOT IDEA!

Kacie told us the GreenHouse kids were trying to get a fundraising event started. After the devastating earthquake in Haiti, the kids at The GreenHouse asked “What can we do to help?” One of the fifth graders, Perla, had a fantastic idea: “We could sell tamales.” We knew we had found our Kingdom Assignment. The \$100 became the “seed” money that purchased the ingredients for the tamales. Boy did it multiply!

The next week, Perla began knocking on doors, telling women in the community about her idea and asking them if they’d be willing to make tamales for the project. These mothers were *eager* to donate their time and talent to help out! Before long, several women had signed-on to make over 300 homemade tamales.



TAMALE SALE

On February 28, Perla, and her friends helped gather the nearly 300 fresh, warm tamales and transported them with us to Sanctuary Covenant Church where they were sold for \$2.00 each. \$600 was raised on the tamales alone. Others from Community Presbyterian Church caught wind of the project and made cash donations.

TAMALAES FOR HAITI PROJECT RAISED \$1100

By the end, the Tamales for Haiti project raised \$1100 for Heartline Ministries in Haiti! We are so proud of Perla and all of the GreenHouse kids who helped with the project. And, we are so grateful to all sacrificially gave of their time, talent, and resources to make the tamales and to CPC for the “seed money”. Praise GOD!

AN OLD FRIEND IN NEED—GILROY, CA

When the recent Kingdom Assignment challenge was announced I raised my hand to receive the \$100 bill immediately. I had no specific plan or vision in mind at the time rather just the pressing need of a friend, John, who I met at our church in Gilroy when Barb and I relocated there from 2000-2005. John had contacted me only a few days before, appealing to me to use my network to help him find a job. When I spoke to him it was clear his need was both great and multifaceted. The Lord led me to form a team with two other Christian men: Dean Tracy, a recruiter, and Larry McElvain, a family counselor. God worked mightily through this team, who provided pro-bono coaching, recruiting and counseling, and came along side John and his family during these difficult times. We received the following note from John which provides the best description of the impact on all of us.

A LETTER OF THANKS

I want to take a moment and thank all of you for your generous offerings of help to assist us through this storm. It seems I have for the first time, a lack of true words to articulate what in our hearts are as to the blessings we have received from each of you. To think this all started at a moment in time, when the next steps for my wife and I, were separation and probably divorce. A chance email started a land slide of grace that began with a simple message one Sunday from your Pastor. What extraordinary ripples came to be from that one pebble tossed into the waters of grace. Please thank your church and your pastor for the generosity we received by the hand of a member.

A NEW JOB!

Fifteen months of unemployment will soon come to an end on June 1 2010. Dean, your expertise, your time, your abilities to help me build a stronger resume, improve my word choice, and strengthen my interview skills, helped me secure this new job. These months of unemployment reduced me to someone who lost hope, lost confidence, lost vision and lost the energy to keep looking. You graced me with a renewed vigor to proceed and continue at this quest by talking me through many aspects of job hunting and this final interview. I cannot thank you enough.

HOPE FOR A HURTING MARRIAGE

During these months, my marriage of 21 years fell into ruins. My bride had had enough of the stress of losing everything and losing faith not just in ourselves but the very one who had anointed us in marriage. Larry, your counseling gift is phenomenal. When speaking with you, my wife and I felt safe and comfortable. THE LOVE DARE

It's my belief that we all need to be intentional about improving our marriages. Bad marriages can be made good, good ones can be great, and great marriages can be even better! With that in mind, I used my \$100 Kingdom Assignment challenge to go toward purchasing copies of *The Love Dare*. *The Love Dare* is a Christian marriage-enrichment book by Stephen Kendrick and Alex Kendrick that was popularized in the movie *Fireproof* where a husband is trying to rekindle the love in his marriage.

27 MEN TAKE THE LOVE DARE!

I helped lead 27 men through *The Love Dare*. The dare is a 40 day journey of working on your marriage and doing something intentional each day to make it better. Each day has a passage to read and a dare for you to do for your spouse and your marriage. I was in contact with these men offering encouragement and ideas for the different days. Hopefully this assignment was able to improve the quality of all 27 marriages in one way or another, but if it truly helps just one, it was worth it!

BETTER MARRIAGES AT CPC

This assignment had a tremendous impact on the marriages of these 27 men and their spouses. Here are some quotes from some of the guys who participated:

"I'm blown away that in just a week it has had a tremendous effect on my marriage. A week ago I would have labeled my marriage as good with the realization that I don't put nearly the effort into it like I do for work, running, church, friendships, etc. My wife has responded in a very cool way and it's only taken about 15 minutes a day."

“I’m totally learning that it really was God’s design for us to put others ahead of ourselves. Life is way richer. The Fall screwed everything up but Jesus is in the business of restoring our hearts and it’s awesome!”

“I’ve noticed something interesting. So far each day’s dare has been exactly the needed thing for my wife; I don’t think that’s an accident.”

“Tonight, with the chandelier low and the dining room table set, we wined and dined. This would not have happened without the love dare.”

“I thought I was a pretty good husband. But when my wife responds positively to the little things I have been asked by the book to do, it shows me I have not been near the level of a thoughtful husband I had imagined myself to be.”

“Very rewarding and a great building block for all kinds of other upgrades in the marriage.”

“Thanks for keeping us honest and also providing the books. This is a tough challenge but I’m starting to see some changes in myself and my marriage.”

I also did the dare again for my own wife. She could not believe that I did this for her again and was totally blown away that I led 27 other men through the process. We have decided to officially renew our vows in December when her parents are in town and we are excited for our kids to see this.

MEXICO MISSION TRIP AND YWAM

My initial reaction to receiving \$100 for a Kingdom Assignment was: “Wow, what a great way to apply the parable into practice.”

SO MANY IDEAS!

Since this is my first time participating in the Kingdom Assignment, I prayed about what to do. I thought about things I love to do like putting together “Cookies In a Jar”, selling cards with biblical verses and my photography pictures on them, OR make lumpia shanghai (egg rolls) and selling them by the dozens, OR selling Fifth Avenue jewelry. I consulted my sons and the big vote was: **EGG ROLLS!** Those are easy to make, cost effective and \$100 of fresh ingredients would be sufficient to produce egg rolls so I could raise at least \$600.

My goal was to raise \$250 to sponsor one of our youths going to Mexico, \$300 to go to YWAM Cebu’s children feeding ministry and whatever is left, I plan to contribute to the scholarship fund of YWAM’s Discipleship Training School for a youth in Cebu.



I spent the first two weeks advertising to family and friends and bringing my egg rolls in to meetings and offices as samples. Then when I got my first week's orders, I shopped for the ingredients where I could get them cheaper without compromising quality; rolled them up, froze them, and delivered them.

EGG ROLL RESULTS

To date, I was able to multiply the initial \$100 to \$600. Sales: \$400; Donations: \$100. That's about 1,600 egg rolls and more being rolled! That's a first for me! But I truly enjoyed making them and I was filled with joy knowing that this is going to bless God's work through the recipients.

As a result of this Kingdom Assignment project, it blessed one of our youths to be part of the Mexico Mission project that helped build homes for five families through the Amor Ministries. The funds we are sending to YWAM Cebu will cover 3 months of their feeding program cost to feed at least 450 street children of Talisay City and will partially fund the tuition of a Filipino youth attending the DTS training in Cebu in June. I intend to continue this Kingdom Assignment project to help pay fully the tuition fee and also to be able to contribute towards our mission outreach team to Cebu this fall.

Personally, I learned that when we become "intentional" in bringing Christ to the lives of other people, it becomes contagious and we see growth just like the parable. Likewise, if we don't do anything with our gifts, we become stagnant.
